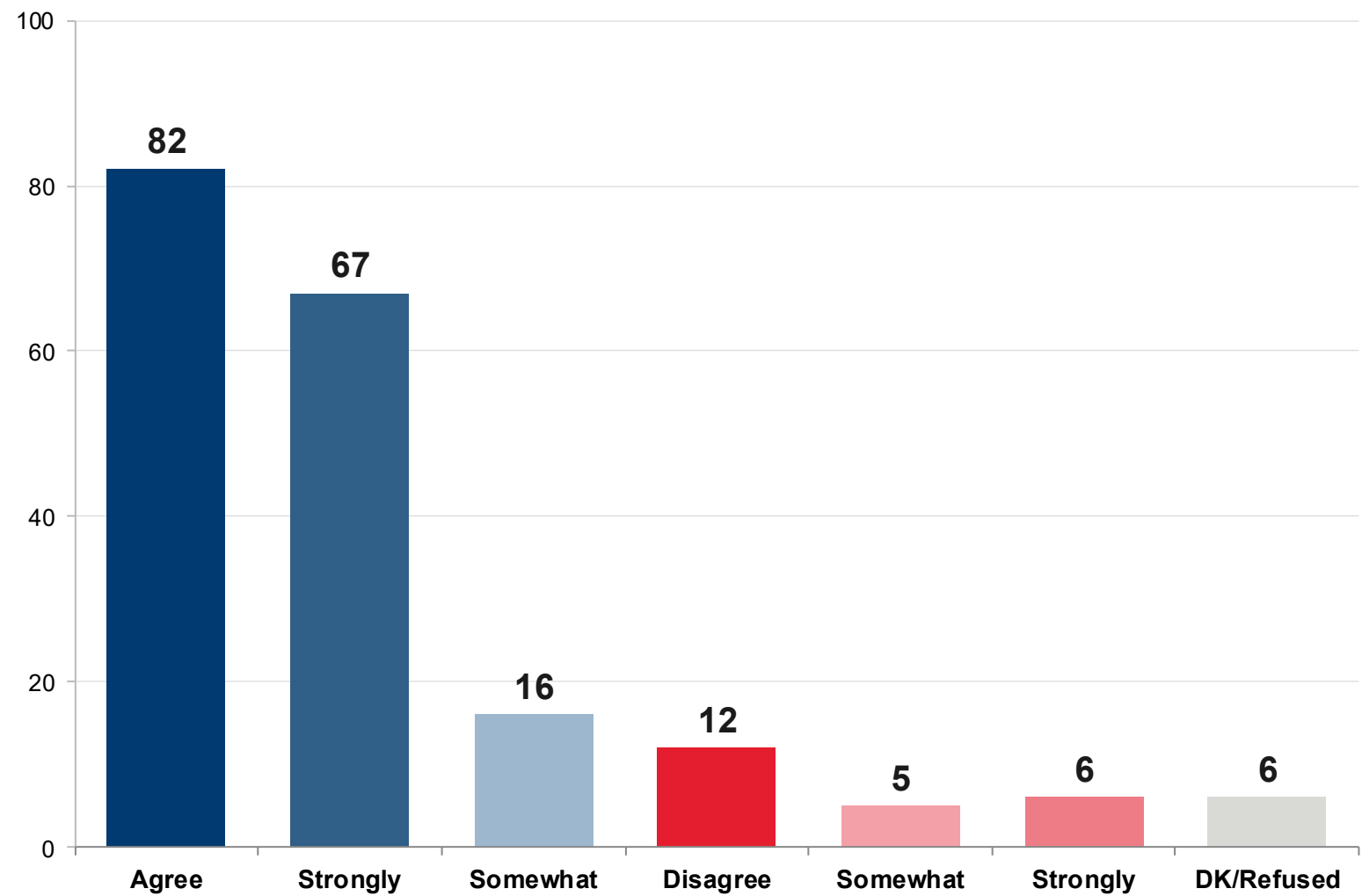

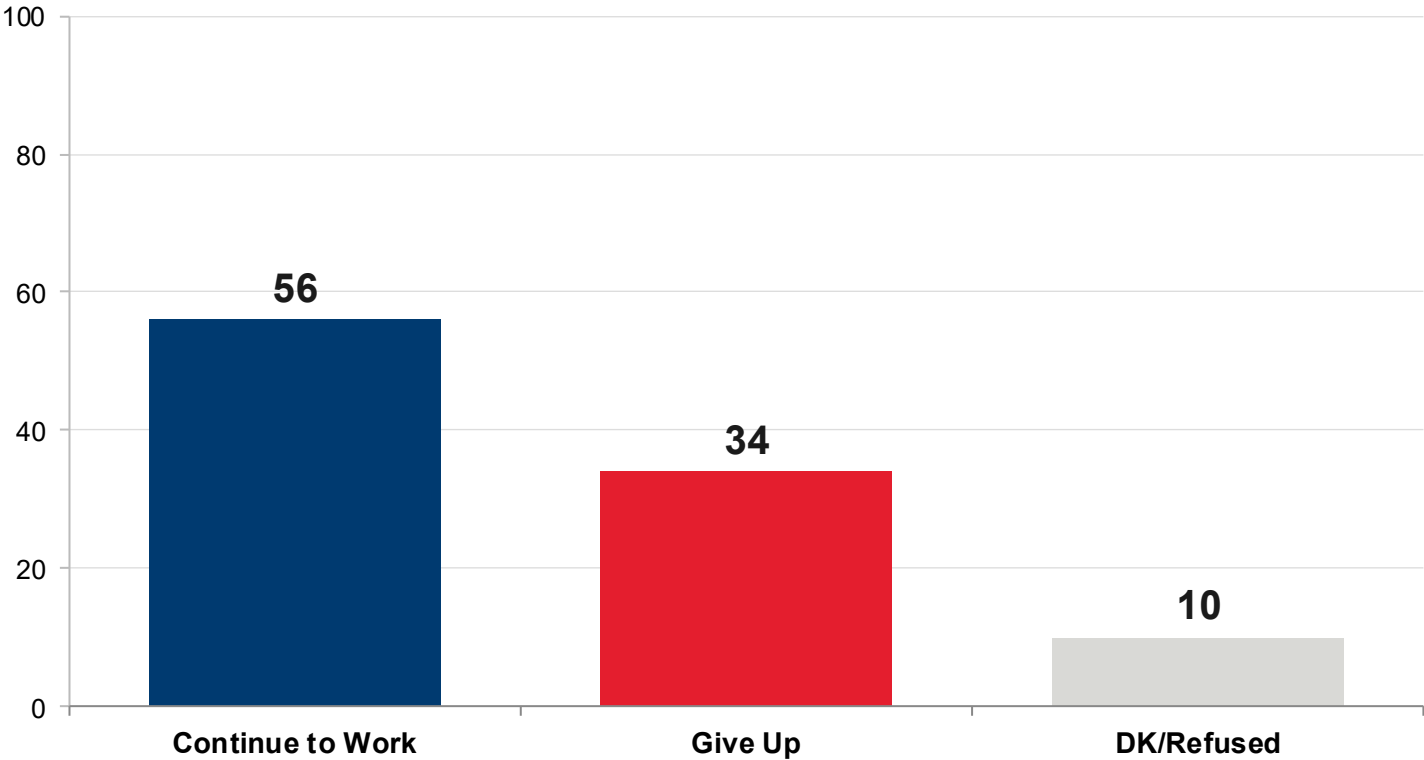
Agree/Disagree: “Only United States citizens should be allowed to vote in elections for U.S. President, U.S. Senate, and U.S. House.”

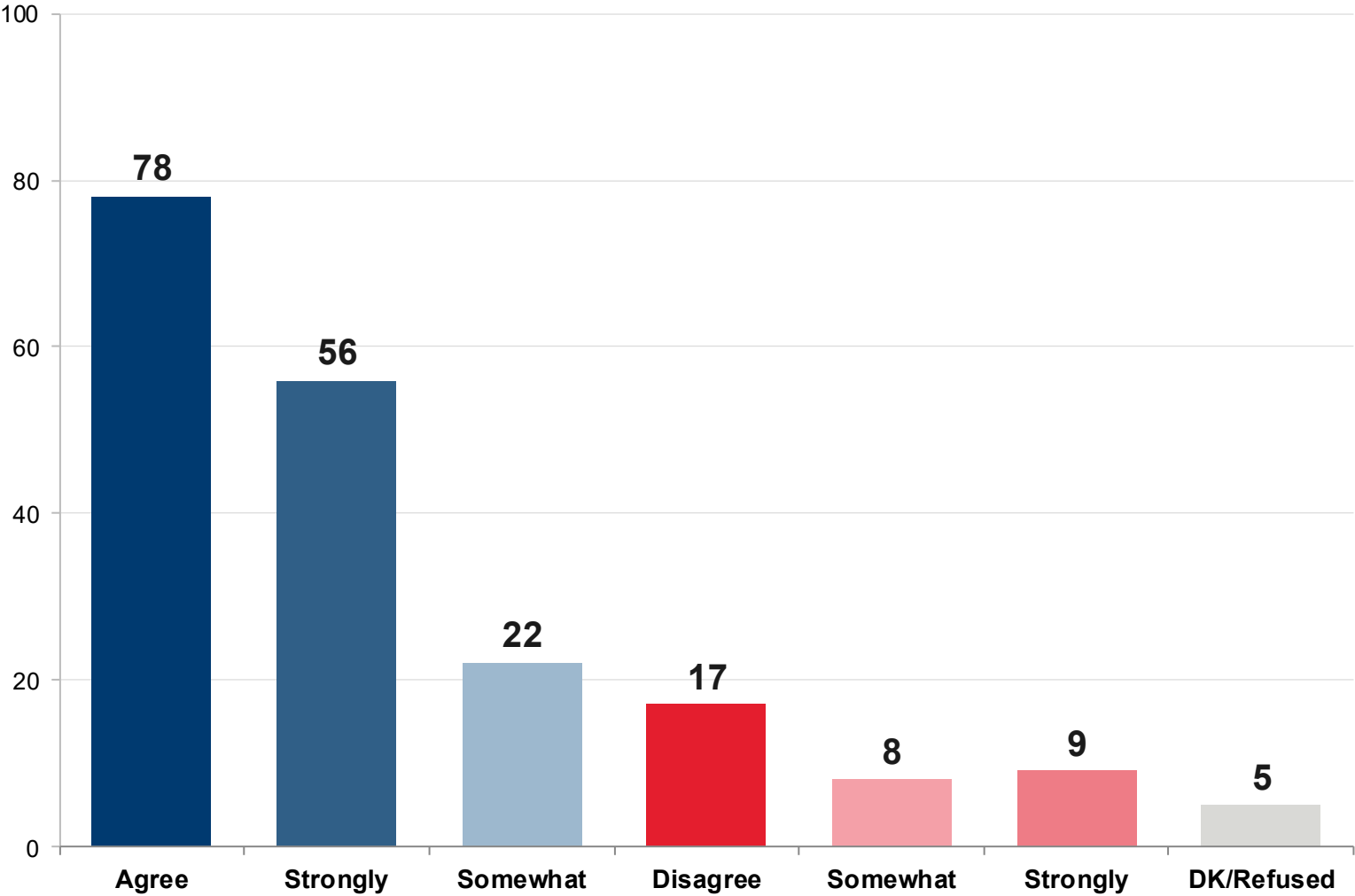
The SAVE America Act is a 32-page bill that does four things: it requires proof of citizenship to register to vote, it requires photo identification when voting, it fixes problems in current law that allow people to register to vote without proving citizenship, and it requires states to check their voter rolls against federal government records to identify noncitizens who may be registered. The bill has already passed the House of Representatives.

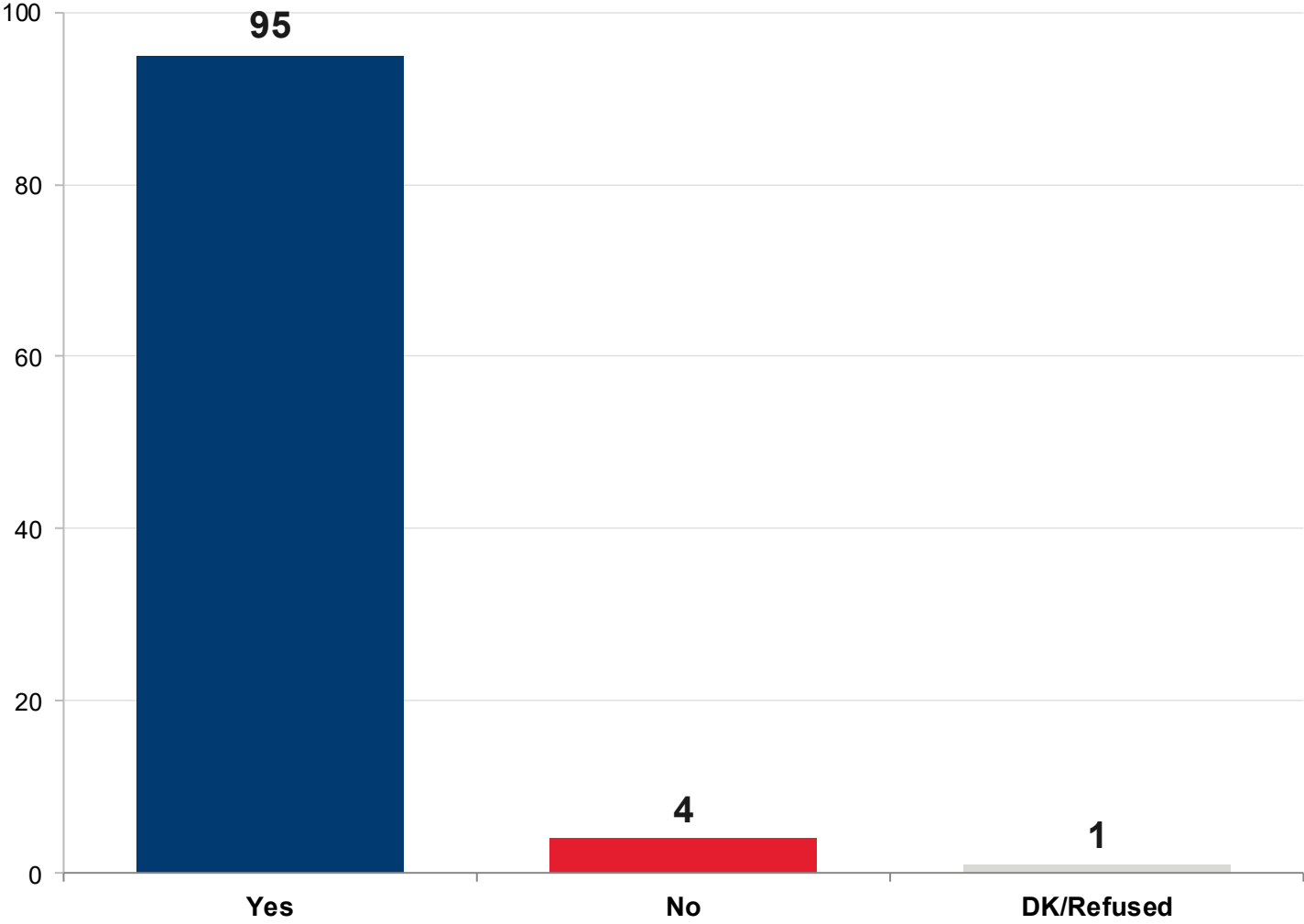

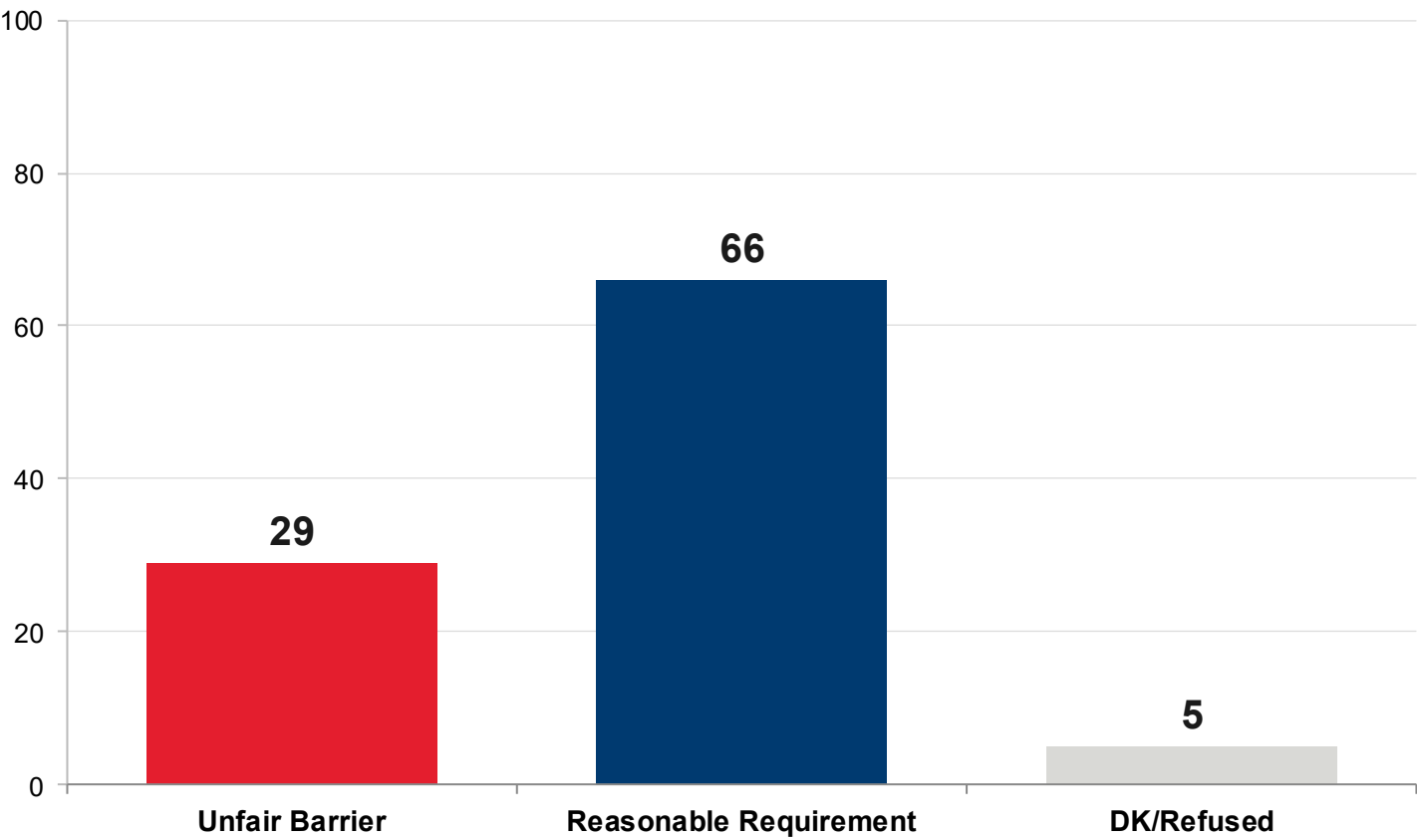
Do you currently have a valid photo ID, such as a driver's license, state ID, or passport?

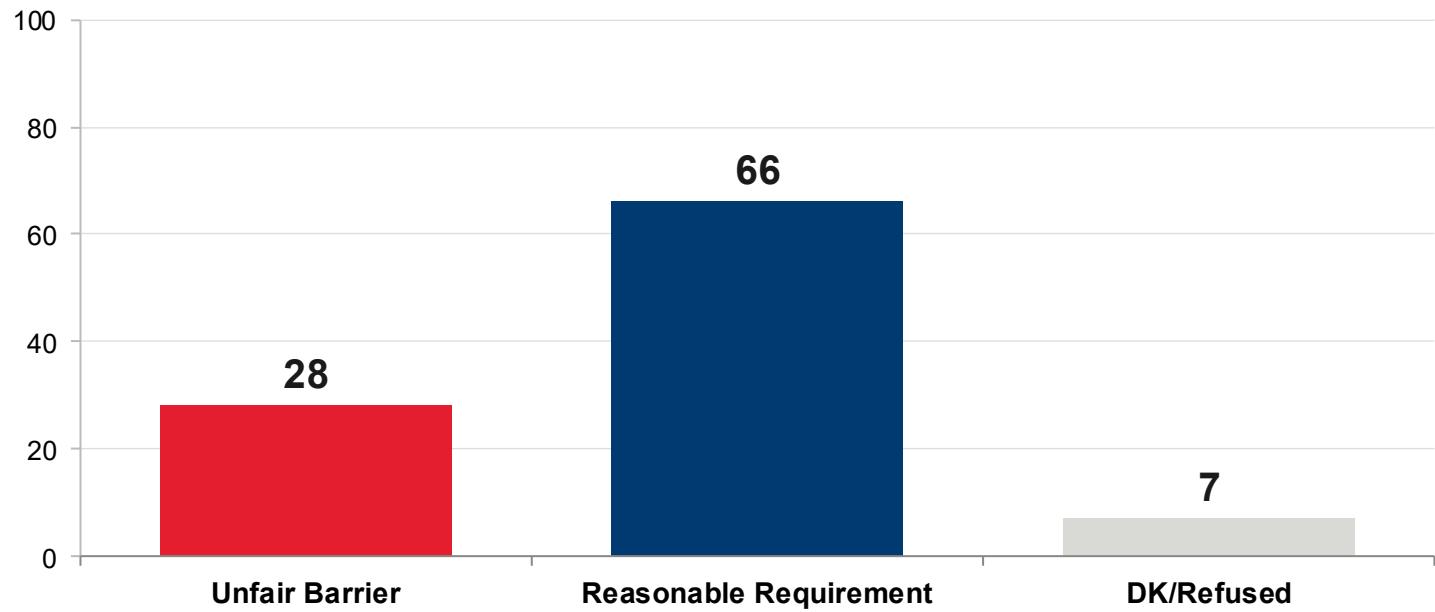

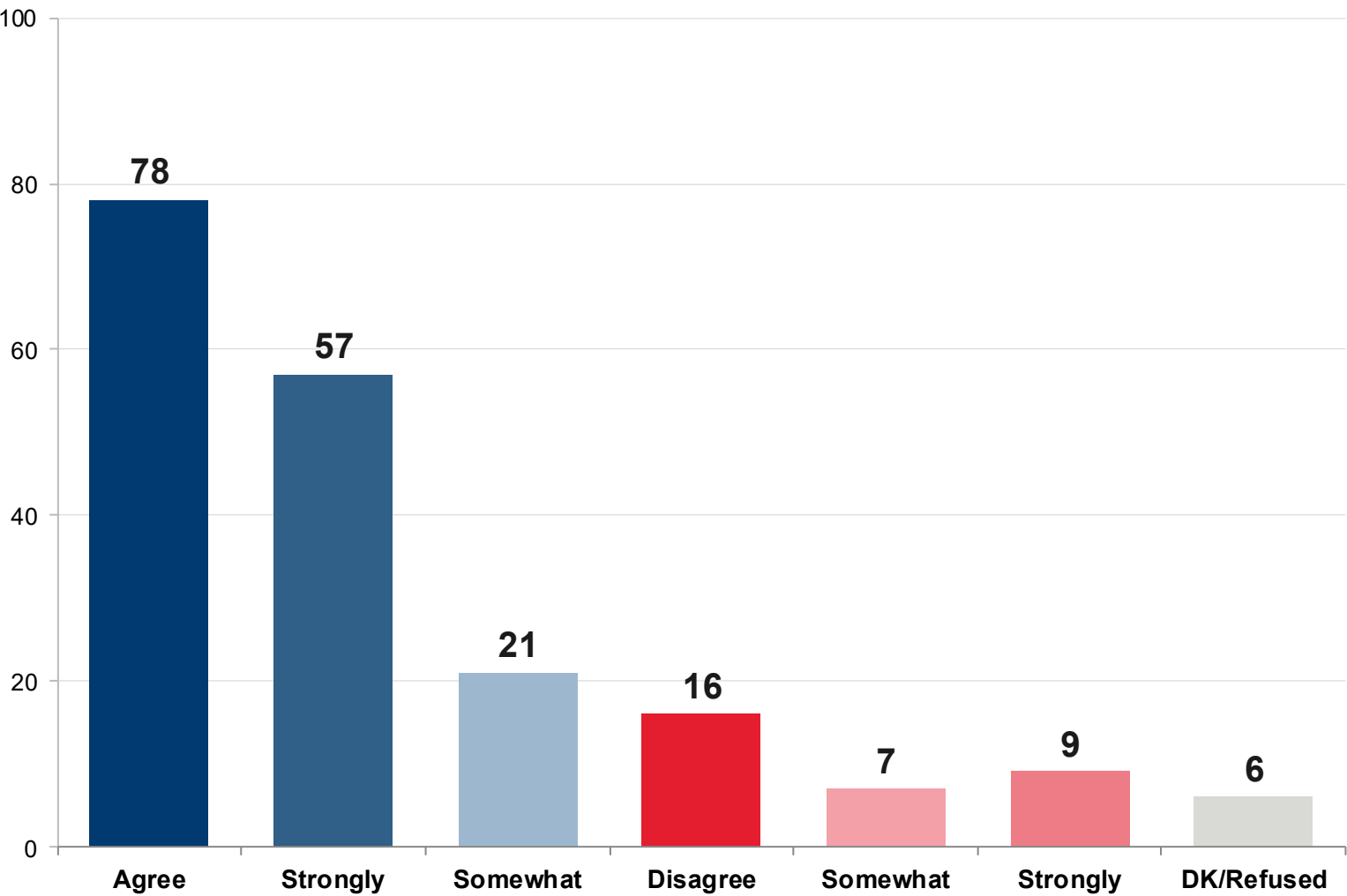
People register to vote to confirm their eligibility and residency. Eligibility confirms a person is qualified to vote — for example, that they are a U.S. citizen and old enough to vote. Residency determines which ballot they receive. Once registration is complete, the person's name is added to the list of qualified voters for their precinct. Registration generally happens when a person turns 18 or moves, not every year. Some people say requiring proof of citizenship to register to vote is unfair, because women who have changed their name would have to show additional documents, such as a marriage certificate. Others say it is a reasonable requirement that the vast majority of Americans can easily meet, because those same documents are already required to get a driver's license or REAL ID, and voter registration typically happens only once every few years.

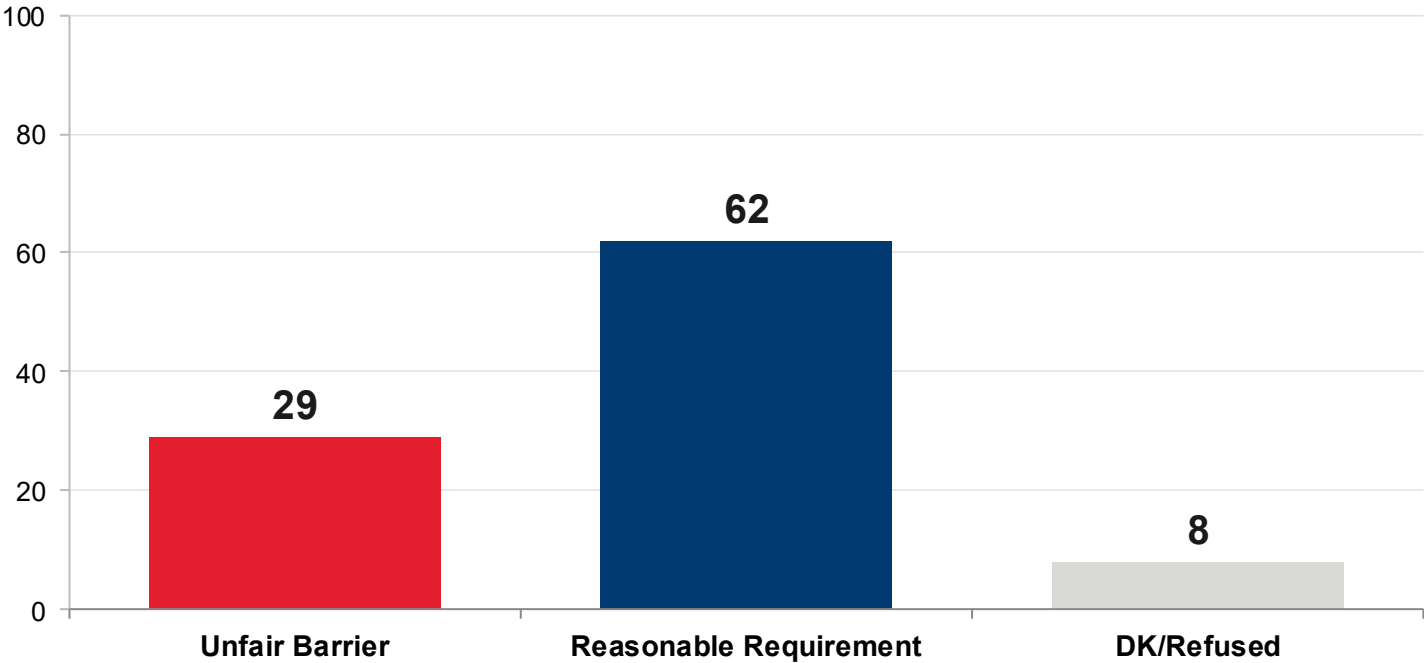
Agree/Disagree: "Proof of United States citizenship should be required to register to vote in American elections."

As written, the SAVE America Act addresses a concern that many of its opponents have raised: that the requirement is unfair to women, because a married woman's current name may differ from the name on her birth certificate. Critics note this could force a woman to track down additional paperwork, such as a marriage certificate or divorce decree, to bridge the two names. The bill was revised from its original version to address this concern. As currently written, a woman in that situation can simply sign a short statement affirming that the name on her document is her previous name, rather than having to produce that extra paperwork. Knowing this, which comes closer to your view about requiring proof of citizenship to register to vote in federal elections?
